Diana's passion for animals and their habitats began at 17 when she went on a Field Service Scholarship to the United States.

Since that time she has travelled extensively and worked in many parts of the world including Melbourne, Los Angeles and New York, where she worked as a guide in the Museum of Natural History specializing in Dinosaurs and Ocean Life.

In Los Angeles she attended UCLA University and studied bio geography (the effect of nature on the land) and spent time in the American deserts among the cactus and snakes.

Diana is a certified Scuba Diver and has done many dives in the Caribbean, the Red Sea, and Thailand and has learned much about the underwater world.

Diana is interested in whales and dolphins, as well as monarch butterflies, plants, fishing, insects, birds, travel, and READING BOOKS.

While Diana entertained the students with items of natural history, the stories of their origins and the wonderful travel experiences she has had, she also emphasized the need to read to gain knowledge, to answer the questions generated from our experiences and learn more about our world.
