TAINUI HISTORICAL SOCIETY

MOKAU BUTCHER TO OPEN AT WEEKENDS

TDN 31/1/1958

The six-month old butchery business of William Vernon Norris at Mokau will now stay open 7a.m. to 5p.m. on Saturdays from December 1st until April 30th and until 1p.m. on Saturdays for the remainder of the year. Norris applied for this exemption when he began his business but it was then refused because he could not show that there was a demand for the exemption. Norris has already "obliged" customers over the weekends, according to a reply he made to a question in cross-examination yesterday when his application for exemption from this section of the Shops & Offices Act was heard and approved by Mr A.H. Yort, S.M., at New Plymouth. Norris said his turnover was about £1200 per month. Holidaymakers brought in increased trade in summer. All other shops at Mokau had the exemption he was applying for. Saturday business was the accepted thing especially for people in outlying settlements, and Saturday was the busiest day of the week. Two Mokau businessmen agreed with Mr A.Buchanan, appearing for Norris about what he called the curious habit of people appearing at Mokau to do their business on a Saturday and to then stand on street corners. They were Lawrence Edward Fryday and Frederick Ingram Roebuck. Both told of people arriving for holidays who wanted fresh meat over weekends. Roebuck, who had a grocery and milkbar combined, said that he had installed a deep freeze unit to cope with the demand for meat. Since Norris had opened this trade had slackened off but was still high over weekends.

Mr G.L. Ewart said Taranaki Master Butchers Association was opposed to Saturday opening in this case because the need for it had not been clearly shown. No other butcher's shop in the province opened on a Saturday and the Association was opposed to it on general grounds because of the need for overtime payments. He delivered meat as far as Awakino said Reginald Charles Jury, a Taranaki farmer opposing the application, who has owned the Urenui Butchery since 1952. He employed four people in the butchery. Saturday deliveries would not be popular with the staff and would mean overtime payments. Moreover there had never been any demand from the Mokau over Saturday deliveries. Norris's extended hours would not be favourable to Jury's business. Mokau was 45 to 50 miles north of New Plymouth and a long distance from any town in the north said Mr Yort in his decision. Apart from tourists there were isolated settlement such as Mahoenui and since Norris'began business were now better served and it must be good for these settlements and the public generally which was paramount not whether Norris's business had any effect upon Jury's. It seemed actually that Norris's business had already made what effect it might have upon Jury's simply by opening.

Ngā Hapū o Poutama – Pānui

Tēnā ra koutou katoa,

It's been a busy several weeks for Poutama and a while since we have had an update published.

To start with, this years' Te Ra O Te Oro will be held Feb $10_{
m th}$ from 10:am at Te Kawau Pā. Te Oro is a Poutama tipuna who worked and fought for his people of Poutama and their rights. We've had some wonderful and interesting guest speakers over the years and look forward to this years' guest speaker; Rangi Kipa. Rangi is a well renowned carver and traditional tattoo artist. Feel free to pop along to share in the commemorations of Te Oro Watihi. Bring a plate for shared kai. In the last few years the erosion south of the Tongaporutu River mouth has accelerated resulting in the disappearance of cave carvings and one of the 'Three Sisters'. The bones and associated taonga have been progressively shifted to the inland portion of the urupa over the years. However, over the last few months a number of items have been removed from the area including from the urupa. The Ministry of Culture and Heritage have claimed ownership of these

items and sent them to Auckland to be prepared for a museum. They have delayed informing hapū and iwi for up to 6 weeks. It is illegal to remove items from private land, and from an archaeological site. The correct process is to leave the taonga in their location and inform the landowner or museum. This is important so as to understand the context they are found in. As a result we've been visited and interviewed by Te Karere and One News. We are working with Heritage NZ to solve the issue of how to protect these tapu areas from human interference.

The rain was welcomed by farmers and gardeners alike – it's good to see the place green again. Hopefully we'll have a Mānuka flow this season. Three poor seasons in a row will be disastrous for some beekeeping businesses.

Raw Honey v Pasteurised Honey - Without a question, raw is best. Honey doesn't need to be pasteurized to make it safe. The pasteurization process actually strips the honey of many of its beneficial nutrients. A lot of honey found in the supermarket is not raw honey but "commercial" regular honey, some of which has been pasteurized (heated to at least 65 - 70 degrees Celsius or more, followed by rapid cooling), for easy filtering and bottling so that it looks cleaner, smoother and runny, more appealing on the shelf, and easier to handle and package. Pasteurization also kills the beneficial bacteria and enzymes that are naturally occurring in honey. Vitamins, minerals and antioxidants are damaged by heat. If your 'runny' honey soon starts to crystalize, it hasn't gone off - it's real genuine, full of goodness raw and natural honey. To bring your raw honey to a liquid texture, place the jar in a warm space, i.e hot water cupboard or bowl of warm water. Otherwise just enjoy it in its natural state; full of all the goodness in life collected by the hard working humble honey bee.





From your Councillor

Firstly, I wish to extend a big thank you to everyone that made the effort to get to my Ratepayers meeting on the 6th of January. It was very pleasing to have contributions from so many different people, and the feeling of a re-emerging community spirit is very encouraging. I provided a lengthy report to staff on the topics discussed and each manager will handle the topics that are in their portfolio. I had a brief discussion with our Group Manager- Assets regarding rubbish and Transfer stations and he was impressed by the level of community response to the issue. He is concerned that the local 'perceptions' of Transfer station usage and the identity of those depositing rubbish at the recycling bins does not align with staff monitoring results in either instance. We both feel another public meeting in Mokau on this topic will be needed.

A question was asked at the meeting about the dollar returns from recycling and whether it was being credited against the costs of collection. I'm unable to provide the specific dollar figures, but can say that for the 2016/17 year we were able to recycle 5% of the 10533 tons of waste that went through the landfill gate, and sell a further 3% as landscape products. From our 2016/17 Annual Report (pg 41), the Operating Income for Solid Waste Management was \$1,067,000, Operating Expenditure was \$1,740,000, and Capital Expenditure was \$124,000. This resulted in Net Expenditure of \$797,000, of which \$770,000 was funded by Rates.

Our Annual Plan for 2017/18 (the budget for this year, on which this years Rates were struck) shows on page 24 that Solid Waste Operating Income is budgeted at \$998,000 (less than 2016/17 due to forecast decreased volumes), Operating Expenditure will be \$1,902,000, and Capital Expenditure of \$316,000, resulting in Net Expenditure of \$1,220,000, of which \$758,000 will be funded by Rates, compared to \$770,000 last year.

Upgrading of the Mokau Public Toilets had not been in the plan for this year, nor for the next few years, however it's priority has been elevated dramatically and investigations and planning have commenced already, at the expense of some other planned project. Options initially being considered are; upgrade and expand on the present site, a new larger structure on the existing site, or establish a second toilet block at another site, say in the vicinity of the Whitebait Inn. The new Benneydale Toilet, with services (power, water, and sewerage) already on site, cost \$230,000, and was built with the existing toilets still operating – a challenge at Mokau if redeveloping the existing site. Any feedback and ideas from you would be much appreciated.

Another topic I managed to cover with the Group Manager – Assets, was the pressure fluctuations in the water supply. There is a valve on the main line at the treatment plant that automatically opens or closes in response to measured pressures in the water line, however it had been sticking closed when it should have been open, and has now been replaced. As I said at the meeting, a SCADA electronic management system is to be installed that will immediately notify staff of any problems, most of which will be able to be managed remotely. However, until that is installed, if there are any problems with the water, or any other of our services, please ring the Council immediately on 0800 9324357 anytime, day or night, and let us know.

Cathy O'Callaghan and her team were thrilled with the number of you that attended her meetings to talk about the District Plan Review and the possible 'key future moves' for Mokau.

By the time you get to read this, Cathy and her team, plus Jim Dahm and Bronwen Gibberd (Coastal engineering experts), will have held another meeting in the Hall, this time covering the 'Assessment of Coastal Hazards – Mokau and Awakino'. If you missed this and wish to know more, please let me know.

I'll have the next instalment of answers and information for you next month, but if you have any queries in the meantime, please get in touch.
