Moa Street was closed to through-traffic, hence a much safer and enhanced service. A special thank you goes to Vinni and Vibhah Rao who undertook a lot of the planning and setting up on the day to ensure this could happen, and also to Waitomo District Council.

This year the Piopio Cos Club provided refreshments after the service (the cost largely covered by the RSA); very fitting as the RSA is in the process of affiliating with the club. All would agree it was a great family atmosphere and spread.

It was great to see all schools taking an increasing role; difficult considering the timing with school holidays. A polished speech by College head student Ava MacKenzie (top left) reflecting on the role of musicians during the World Wars will be a hard act to follow.

Special thanks to our current service men and women – an integral part of the parade, piper Bob Dawson, bugler Steve McQuilkin, RSA rep Bill Wana, Gavin Todd who has taken care of the crosses for the last few years, and Waitanguru branch of RWNZ. Most of all a big thank you to Pam Voyce, our MC.

Smooth running of the day is no accident and a huge amount of preparation happens beforehand to ensure the commemoration is appropriate, and reflects the diversity of our community.

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WE ALL know the sad story of what happened to the ANZACS and we all know why we mark this day but no one knows a lot about the story behind the music and musicians who were a part of the ANZACS and what their role was as part of the ANZAC campaign at Gallipoli. Following is an excerpt from Ava's speech...

On the 25th of April 1915 the first troops were sent in along with some musicians. They were sent along to help lift the soldiers spirits and to help carry the wounded soldiers back to base, mostly under the fire of other troops. Musicians were among the first casualties between ship and shore.

A bullet hit a singer of comic songs, his name remembered just as Skinner. The stretcher bearers from Wellington and Taranaki made it ashore quickly, "The beach was utter chaos recalled bandsman/ stretcher bearer Laurie Smith, no one seemed to know where anybody else was"

A few months after the 25th of April an Australian officer recalled New Zealand troops holding a concert at Gallipoli "one man with a cornet proved a good performer; several others sang while some gave reactions. We all sat down in various places in the gully and joined in with the choruses, it was all very enjoyable while it lasted but as darkness came on rifle fire began on the tops of the hills. Occasionally shell fire completely drowned out the

sound of the voices bringing the concert to a close."

Later on, a small band of about thirty men found a ledge jutting into the valley about a hundred yards from the Turkish lines. Their aim, while they were on the ledge, was to fill the valley with the sound of their music to help lighten the mood and give the soldiers motivation. Some of the songs that the musicians played during this war were Long Live the King, Don't Hear them Shouting, the Veterans Song and Sweet and Low, wrote colonel Willam Malone.

Another New Zealand musician that helped in the war was a man named Arthur Vivian Carbines. Before he volunteered to join the troops he was a well known musician in Auckland and New Plymouth. He had written hymns, songs and instrumental pieces that he used to play at Baptist Churches and orphan clubs. He volunteered two weeks after the war had started and smuggled his violin onto the ship. Sadly, while he was helping recover a wounded man on the 8th of August 1915 an inexperienced soldier mistook him for one of the Turks and he was sadly shot.

Music has been used through years to help people in tough times and to help lift people's spirits; it has been used for motivation and hope. Music has also been a way to help bring people close together and that was why there were musicians helping contribute in war time.


Several brigade members have recently attended intensive training courses. Our district is extremely lucky to have such a dedicated team of volunteers.

A great splash of pink arrived at school on Friday, May 19 for Pink Shirt Day.


One hundred dollars was raised for the anti-bullying cause. Classes continue to talk about what bullying looks like and what we can do about it to both protect ourselves and help the "bully".



Matariki holiday next month

MATARIKI is the Māori name for the cluster of stars also known as the Pleiades. It rises in midwinter and for many Māori, it heralds the start of a new year. Iwi across New Zealand understand and celebrate Matariki in different ways and at different times.

Matariki is an abbreviation of 'Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tāwhirimātea ('The eyes of the god Tāwhirimātea') and refers to a large cluster of stars, known in some European traditions as the Pleiades.

According to Māori tradition, the god of the wind, Tāwhirimātea, was so angry when his siblings separated their parents, Ranginui the sky father and Papatūānuku the earth that he tore out his eyes and threw them into the heavens.

Matariki is now a special public holiday in New Zealand. This year it will be held on Friday, July 14.



Friday social nights are from 6.30pm with bar and kitchen facilities also available.






At Piopio Primary School we all heard about Cyclone Gabrielle and we felt so sorry about the devastation that it caused. Room 6 our senior class understood how scary it would be waking up one day and finding that your belongings are gone. Room 6 wanted to help in some way, so they decided to have a Market Day, which they decided to have on Tuesday the 28th of March.

Over 6 weeks they planned their own stalls. They had to find the resources for their stalls and purchase prizes for the games. They ended up with 19 stalls. Some of the stalls were, bowl a teacher, balloon pop, target shot, baking, bean bag toss, bottle flip and egg and spoon race. They decided on having tokens to buy an item or have a turn at an activity. Student leaders from Piopio College came to help out at the stalls

Aria...

Aria began in 1904, when some 30 blocks of around 200 acres (81ha) were given under the Homestead Acts.

Four small mines produced 53,000 tons from Aria coalfield between 1917 and 1961.

To the east of Aria a lime quarry opened in the 1960s. A new post office opened in 1922, and there was a butter factory from around 1911. Aria statistical area, which also includes Piopio, covers 531.79km2 and had an estimated opulation of 1300 as of June 2022.

Aria community had a population of 129 in the 2018 census.





Piopio Primary School Trip

On Monday the 15th of May all the students, staff accompanied by some whānau went to visit some important places in our area. This is part of the concept Piopio Primary is learning in 2023, 'the past leads us forward'. Three buses transported the school to the first site, the Frederick Miller Memorial, which is the site of the first missionary in the area. Once we had climbed the hill, Matt Buckley shared the history of the site with us. He talked about how Frederick Miller and his wife travelled from Kawhia by waka and chose the site because the missionaries could see who was coming. It was particularly foggy and so the view of the Mokau River was not visible.














The second site we were welcomed onto was the Wetere/Rauputu homestead. There was a whakatu performed and Ngatai, Marina and Hemi Rauputu talked about the members of the family who had lived in the homestead and the importance of the site to the Maniapoto iwi. It was interesting to visualise the thousands of people who were camping for a hui to agree on the 1904 Kawenata (Covenant), especially considering how remote it would have been and difficult to travel there. On the way back to school the buses stopped to briefly view the Paemako School. Now students have returned to kura they are investigating further the stories they have learnt about and learning more about their own stories.
